



In an effort to maintain a five-star reputation, the owners of Homestead Run and the Business Office will be publishing a series of reminders and modifications to standard lease, rules, and regulations. This column will be called Renee's Reminders, and Renee means business!

- Heads up, people! By now, you should have or are making an attempt to come up to the clubhouse to sign for the rent increase which will go into effect December 1st, 2022. For those that open our mail and chuck it, I'll give you a hint at what it said. Real estate taxes have come down \$14.05. Capital Improvement came down \$0.43, and cost of living was capped at 3.5%. BROWNIES WITH A FALL TWIST

INGREDIENTS

- Cooking spray
- 1 c. plus 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour, spooned and leveled
- 1 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice
- 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. kosher salt
- 1 c. semisweet chocolate chips
- 9 tbsp. (1 stick plus 1 tablespoon) unsalted butter
- 1/4 c. unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1 1/2 c. sugar
- 3/4 c. pumpkin puree
- 3 large eggs
- 1 tsp. pure vanilla extract



INSTRUCTIONS

Make the Brownies:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Line a 9- by 13-inch pan with parchment paper, leaving a 2-inch overhang on the 2 long sides. Grease paper.
- 2. Whisk together flour, pie spice, baking powder, and salt in a bowl. Melt chocolate chips, butter, and cocoa in a small saucepan over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until smooth, 2 to 3 minutes. Whisk together sugar, pumpkin puree, eggs, and vanilla in a separate bowl. Add butter mixture to sugar mixture and stir to combine. Add flour mixture and stir to combine. Transfer to prepared pan.
- 3. Bake until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out with a few moist crumbs attached, 20 to 22 minutes. Transfer to a wire rack and cool completely in pan. Run a knife along the two short sides of the pan and lift brownies from pan using parchment. Remove parchment and transfer brownies to a serving platter.
- 4. If you'd like to further sweeten the brownies, decorate with your choice of icing, candy corn, or marshmallow ghosts!


